According to <u>citytistics</u>, Shawnee is considered a safe place to live with the crime rate relatively low compared to other similarly sized cities.

While this is great news, it's important to mention the city is experiencing an increase in crime.

Prevention is the best way to improve the safety of your home. Fortunately, there are a number of simple, small steps you and your family can take to make your home more secure and to discourage burglars from making an attempt to break in. Take a good look around your home to identify areas of vulnerability and then take action to improve your home's safety.

- Secure windows and doors, including garage doors
- Secure vehicles parked outside, engage the alarm if available
- Check your mailbox daily
- Plan for packages if possible
- Know your neighbors

Additional considerations:

- Install a security system
- Install outdoor motion sensors/cameras
- Install a doorbell camera

A family dog can also be a big help in preventing certain crimes.

Tips for seasonal allergies

Spring means flower buds and blooming trees — and if you're one of the millions of people who have seasonal allergies, it also means sneezing, congestion, a runny nose and other bothersome symptoms. Seasonal allergies — also called hay fever and allergic rhinitis — can make you miserable. But before you settle for plastic flowers and artificial turf, the Mayo Clinic suggests trying these simple strategies to keep seasonal allergies under control.

Reduce your exposure to allergy triggers

To reduce your exposure to the things that trigger your allergy signs and symptoms (allergens):

 Stay indoors on dry, windy days. The best time to go outside is after a good rain, which helps clear pollen from the air

- Avoid lawn mowing, weed pulling and other gardening chores that stir up allergens
- Wear a face mask if you do outside chores
- Remove clothes you've worn outside and shower to rinse pollen from your skin and hair
- Don't hang laundry outside pollen can stick to sheets and towels

Take extra steps when pollen counts are high

Seasonal allergy symptoms can flare up when there's a lot of pollen in the air. These steps can help you reduce your exposure:

- Check your local TV or the internet for pollen forecasts and current pollen levels
- If high pollen counts are forecasted, start taking allergy medications before your symptoms start or as prescribed

- Close doors and windows at night if possible or any other time when pollen counts are high
- Avoid outdoor activity in the early morning when pollen counts are highest.

Keep indoor air clean

There's no miracle product that can eliminate all allergens from the air in your home, but these suggestions may help:

- Use air conditioning in your house and car
- Use high-efficiency filters and follow regular maintenance schedules
- Keep indoor air dry with a dehumidifier
- Use a portable high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter in your bedroom
- Clean floors often with a vacuum cleaner that has a HEPA filter.

Crimson Ridge trash, recycling and yard waste collection is scheduled on Thursday of each week. Delays and large item pickup information is located on the eNeighbors.com calendar (updated for the current calendar year).

Receptacles may be placed at the curb no earlier than the evening prior to pick-up and must be stored no later than the morning after pick-up. To ensure trash containers aren't attracting wildlife (mice, raccoons, coyotes, flies, mosquitoes, etc.) up to and into our homes, please store trash and recycling containers in your garage.

If you prefer to store containers outdoors, please ensure containers are secured and out of sight.

Crimson Ridge Exterior Home Project Reminders

Any home exterior modifications (including but not limited to paint, siding, building additions, fencing) or equipment installations (including but not limited to swing sets, basketball goals) must have an approved Architectural Change Request (ACR) prior to construction or work start.

Please allow for up to 10 business days for standard request responses. A non-standard request may require longer (this may include non-standard paint colors, additions, etc). To submit an ACR, visit payhoa.com, click requests and ACR Request Form – New Submission. You can see pending and completed requests as well.
